

Primary Grammar: Big Differences

When using comparative adjectives, we can use **much, so much, a lot, even, or far** to enhance it.

- He was **so much** taller than her.
- There was **a lot** more food on her plate than his plate.

We can also use **almost, nearly, not quite, roughly, more or less or about** with 'as... as' and the 'the same as'.

- He is **almost** as tall as me.
- She is **more or less** the same height as her.
- He is **nearly** the same height as him.
